

We Are F-A-M-I-L-Y

During September the importance of family has played a significant role in our school activities. One way we've started the day is by having children graph their responses to a question regarding their family. Some questions have included: Do you jump on the bed at home? And, Do you leave your shoes on or take them off at home? In this way, children are not only experiencing how data can be collected and represented, but we hope to draw their attention to some ways in which families can be the same and different.

In the art room, we've made family puppets - a multi-step process beginning by choosing a shade of "people-colored paint" and then adding features with yarn, googley eyes, and colored shapes. The children also designed quilts from colorful fabric squares with an eye for hot and cool colors, and finger painted with shaving cream. At the sensory table children strengthened their fine motor muscles (so important for future writing skills) by working play dough and stringing beads. A highlight, however, was washing baby dolls and discussing how boy and girl babies are similar and different. This was such a hit, with children squeezed elbow-to-elbow for a

turn, that we decided to open it for a second week. We must have the cleanest babies in town!

Some of the books we've read in the home center and during snack have included: *Have You Seen My Duckling* by Nancy Tafuri, *Whoever You Are* by Mem Fox, *Alligator Baby* by Robert Munsch, and *The Family Book* by Todd Par. During one reading of The Family Book early in the year, a child noticed one of the characters had a unique hairdo exclaiming, "He has funny looking hair!" This spurred a great discussion about differences and feelings. Does the hairdo look strange to you because it is different than you're used to? How might this man feel if you said that to him? What are some ideas of what you could say that would also keep his feelings safe? The children came up with many ideas like: "Hey, cool hair!" "I've never seen hair like that before!" or "Wow!"

One way we've encouraged the children to get involved in reading is to have them think about the similarities between a family and their friends at King Street. They've then taken pictures or asked an adult to take pictures of how their behavior at school is similar to their behavior at home (i.e. families and school friends both have fun together, eat together, listen to one another, solve problems together, and help one another). These pictures then became part of a book. As one child put it, "We're reading the pictures of ourselves!"

The children have also taken turns presenting pictures of their families during circle time. Afterwards, they attached the pictures to a beautiful "family tree" in the home center. It's been an inspiring few weeks!

To get a sense of what the children's perspective on family is, we asked them to share their ideas with us:

- I hug my family and I kiss them.
 Sometimes I get mad at them.
- I have two pets in my family. One is a dog and the other is a cat. I go to the park with my family. We love each other really much—all the way to the river and the hills and Alaska

and back.

- I live in preschool. And I laugh a lot with my family.
- I have a brother and we play together. My family lives together in a house. Daddy goes to an office. My brother goes to a school. Mommy talks to people. We jumped on the bed, but then it broke.
- I like to go to restaurants with my family. I like to go to the swimming pool with them too. And I like to go camping with them. And I like to snuggle with my family.
- I pick plums with my mom and dad. I have 4 plum trees and 1 apple tree at my house. The other thing I like to do is wake up and have breakfast with my family. Then I take a bath before I go to sleep.



- Family listens to each other. We like to go to the beach together.
- We jump on the bed. I love my family. I love being with them. My sister and I can do somersaults and a flip. My mom can't because she's too big. My dad is even bigger than my mom.
- A family is people that live together. We go trick or treating on Halloween. I wrestle with my dad. I kiss my mom.
- I like my family because we go to Bent Burger sometimes. A family is a big giant thing in a house and they have fun together.

School snapshot: October 1st, circle time:

Lisa: What should go under the bridge? Dinosaurs? A: Teacher Lisa, you know dinosaurs lived a long time ago! Till before my dad was born.

 A family is something I can love. And you give them lots and lots and lots of love. That's what a family is.
