- Emmett loves construction and turned one of the large soft blocks into a bulldozer. As he zoomed it around the gym, he used it to move the smaller blocks where he wanted them to go.

- Jiraiya, Leandro, and Honora helped sing the Itsy Bitsy Spider song, and worked hard to get their fingers to move like a spider. Elliot showed us how she makes a spider with her full hands!
- Ivy loves the mouse costume. She has worn it every day she has come to school. After she has it on, she puts her hands up and moves them back and forth very carefully in a slow waving motion.

Calla and Honora made delicious pies at the play dough table and shared pieces with all the other play dough workers who were interested in trying some.






Fall is the time of less sunshine, wetter days and the beginning of more time inside. Here are a few ideas to bring some of the beautiful outdoors in!
