It is not hard to imagine the feeling of powerlessness that a child might feel. We work hard to give them three hours of a child-centered environment at King Street, where they are able to reach what they need, follow their curiosity, be heard & validated. Life at home can't always be like that, but here are some simple ideas to help your child empower themselves at home:

- Slow down
- Put things with in their reach
- Try to see their perspective
- Don't over-praise, instead recognize & appreciate efforts.
- Model mistakes & trying again / problem solving
- Recognize & name emotions
- Help build tools for coping with big emotions

The top ten tips they advocate are:

- 1. Stop controlling and start coaching.
- 2. Remember that perfection is not the goal.
- 3. Let him try to do it himself from the earliest age.
- 4. Help her build confidence by tackling manageable challenges.
- 5. Don't set him up for failure.
- 6. Praise effort, not results.
- 7. Teach self-encouragement.
- 8. Model positive self-talk.
- 9. Manage frustrating circumstances.
- 10. Affirm your child's ability to impact the world.
